ADVISING YOUR STUDENTS: FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Dear Fellow Advisor,

ESU students are enthusiastic about many things, but not foreign languages. This means they are typical U.S. undergraduates, and follow in the footsteps of long tradition. As far back as 1979 a major, Federal commission was "profoundly alarmed" to find "serious deterioration in this country's language and research capacity"; after 9/11, foreign language needs have been repeatedly pushed to the headlines, but little has changed. Sadly, Pennsylvania still requires no foreign language study of its high school students, and here at ESU only a handful of departments have any language requirement at all. At registration time – now – the great majority of our students make no connection between their majors and possible language study, despite well-documented benefits of language learning to ALL majors.


What can you do to help? With thanks in advance, we suggest the following:

- Lead your advisees to language courses. Alert them to the fact that language study even one semester – can be an excellent choice for them as a Gen Ed or to internationalize their transcript. The ETS and others note that language study correlates with higher academic scores in general.
- Propose the minor or second major options. Across the country students in all disciplines routinely
 graduate with these options. Your advisees deserve your input on this. Urge them to contact a
 professor in Foreign Languages (Stroud 208) about a minor (18 credits: French, Spanish or German) or
 double major/dual degree (30 credits: French or Spanish) to increase their skills and marketability.
- Melp undo the myths. Students often say that languages are inherently more difficult than other disciplines and that grades are lower in language classes. Neither is true. Beginning courses are calibrated for beginners; no prior experience or special 'gift' is assumed.
- Share with them these highlights of SPRING 2010 offerings:
 - FLAR 116 Arabic 1 (GE): This is the language most in demand today in government. Taught at


